The Rooms



The Standard and Deluxe rooms have a stylish and contemporary décor, warm colours, comfortable furniture and soft furnishings, spacious bathrooms with separate showers and separate WC. Rooms are available with either one king bed or two single beds. Views vary from

seaview, terraced country fields to valley views or inland. All rooms have either a balcony or terrace. Interconnecting rooms, non-smoking rooms and rooms for the physically challenged are also available on request. A number of rooms can also accommodate a rollaway bed on request.



The Executive Rooms are all located on the top floors of the hotel and all have king beds plus breathtaking views of Balluta Bay and the blue Mediterranean sea. In addition to the amenities mentioned above, executive rooms offer free high speed internet and large desk space. Guests staying in the

Service is on terraces overlooking the bay or just a take-away for a picnic on the beach.

Meetings and Events



Le Méridien St Julians can cater for all your business and entertaining requirements:

The 1800 sq m conference centre is situated on one all-purpose floor, featuring an amphitheatre of 141 fixed seats with desks and disabled wheelchair space.

2 large daylight banqueting or meeting rooms and 11 syndicate rooms catering for 8 to 350 people - there is also an executive boardroom which seats 14.

Large daylight break-out room that can also be used as exhibition space. The floor also has dedicated service staff with a fully equipped conference office, separate ground floor conference entrance and extra large conference passenger lift.

Le Méridien St Julians offers a number of Executive Suites and a state-of-art Business Centre with IT booths in the lobby.

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The main Banquet Hall is fitted with gantries for light shows a sound system and electric screens.

There is also a large landscaped terrace which is perfect for coffee breaks, lunch, dinner or receptions for approximately 400 persons.

The Hotel is 200 metres away from the heart of St. Julian's accessible by a beautiful promenade right in front of the hotel.

The Hotel is 12 Km from the Malta International Airport and Valletta, the capital is 8 Km away.

The electricity supply in Malta is 240 volts, 50 hertz. A 3 pin rectangular plug system (similar to UK) is used. Adapters are easy to find. 2 pin sockets are also available in the rooms.

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The Location

St Julians... past, present and future



St Julians now named after its patron saint, was previously known as *Il-Qaliet*, which means 'bays' or 'inlets'. In the middle of the nineteenth century, its population, made up mostly of fishermen and their families consisted of around 600 people.

Work on the building of the town, which was virtually just a place where fishermen could bring up their boats for repair during stormy winters, started with the construction of camps as commissioned by the Count of Pembroke, the Hon. Sidney Herbert. Although Pembroke, a stone's throw away from today's St Julians, it can actually be considered to be the first area that started to be built up in the area.

St George's Barracks was finished in 1868. By the beginning of the 20th century, the population of St Julians had already doubled and just a few years into the century, the amount of full-time residents had reached 3,000.

When the British military base was dismantled altogether in 1979, the use of the barracks started to take a completely different turn. Some parts were rented out as tourist complexes or places of entertainment, others as residential housing.

Spinola Palace built in 1688 and one a host to theatrical displays has now been restored and overlooks a smart contemporary garden.

The promenade stretches from Msida up to the centre of St Julians. St Julians is a mecca for restaurants, cafes, bars, and clubs with Paceville being the favourite area of late-night revellers. Shopping is also available in neighbouring Sliema.

The Le Méridien St Julians façade draws magnificently from the interesting architecture of the surrounding area with a feature of balconies and terraces for all rooms, particularly reflecting the architecture of the early 20th century art nouveau Balluta Buildings.

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Malta



Megaliths, medieval dungeons and Calypso's Cave – The Maltese Islands are positively mythic. The narrow meandering streets of their towns and villages are crowded with Renaissance cathedrals and Baroque palaces. As the countryside is dotted with the oldest known human structures in the world, the Islands have rightly been described as an open-air museum.

The Maltese archipelago lies virtually at the centre of the Mediterranean, with Malta 93km south of Sicily and 288km north of Africa. The archipelago consists of three islands: Malta, Gozo and Comino with a total population of 400,000 inhabitants over an area of 316sq km and a coastline of 196.8km (not including 56.01 km for the island of Gozo).

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
